## Careers for Mineral Collectors

Did you ever think that maybe someday your love for minerals could become a career? When I was young people would ask me, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" How would you answer this question? Since you love minerals and mineral collecting so much, perhaps you might want to go to college and study to become one of the following professionals in the field of minerals and mineralogy.

**Mineral Dealer** To be a mineral dealer you will need training in minerals (geology) and also in business. You will need to know not only how to identify good mineral specimens, but you will also have to know how to advertise and sell them. Most mineral dealers travel many, many miles every year and attend dozens of

mineral shows where they sell their specimens. Most dealers also sell their specimens on the internet. Some even have a mineral shop where travelers can stop in, look over the specimens and buy what they like. Eventually you will also need to buy new specimens from other companies or even go into the field and dig for your own.

**Mineralogist** Mineralogists are geologists who specialize in the field of mineralogy. Professional mineralogists study and analyze the minerals found in a certain location. This often requires many hours in the field actually collecting mineral and rock samples for further study in the laboratory. The information they gather can be used to find ores for starting a mine, for example. Mineralogists are hired by mining companies, petroleum companies and also by governments (like the United States Geological Survey, also known as the USGS).

**Museum Curator** If you really love specimen mineralogy, you may want to specialize in being a museum curator. A “curator” is a person who takes care of the specimens in a museum. As a mineral museum curator, you would keep a record (a catalog) of all the specimens in the collection, plan and prepare the displays for the public to see, buy and trade for new specimens for the collection, remove any specimens that are no longer wanted or needed. A college degree in mineralogy with some specialized learning in the curation of a mineral collection would be necessary.

**Professor** You may want to teach others about minerals and mineralogy. Colleges and Universities all over the world hire Professors and Associate Professors to teach classes about minerals, their properties, forms and uses. Professors have a lot of learning to do before they can teach, so you will need to go to college and earn a Ph.D. degree (at which time you will be called Doctor \_\_\_\_\_).

**Author** Many people who love minerals learn enough about them to write about minerals for books, magazines, and companies that produce learning materials for schools. To do this you would need to study not only minerals and geology, but also writing. As you can see, college education is very, very important to just about every career in minerals and mineralogy. ~via Diamond Dan Publications 10/10

## White Buffalo Turquoise

### Don't Be Fooled By Imitations



Many stones are called “white buffalo turquoise” and there is a lot of confusion as to what truly is a white turquoise. This article will reveal what is the reality. There is a widely quoted source that comes from the Miami Valley Mineral and Gem Club in their newsletter of January, 2002 Vol. 48 #1. It relates that back in 1993, stones were found in a turquoise mine that did not resemble the deep color of turquoise that has been used in Native People's jewelry for centuries. It was so pale that it looked like porcelain.



At the time the name of the mine where it was found on the Shoshone Reservation near Battle Mountain, Nevada was called Dry Creek. Since that time the name has changed but for the purposes of this article we will continue to refer to it as Dry Creek turquoise. The way turquoise gets its color is from heavy metals that are present in the ground where it forms. Blue turquoise occurs when there is copper present, which is the case of the majority of Arizona turquoises. In Nevada, there is more iron present, thus Nevada turquoises are usually more green. The lack of any specific color consistency makes the Dry Creek stones distinctive and unique from other turquoises. It is the most pale of all the turquoises in the world. Because this stone is so rare

and so pale in color, the Shoshone Indians named it “Sacred Buffalo” turquoise after the **legend of the white buffalo**. The Shoshone Indians are not known for their jewelry work



so they sell or trade the Sacred Buffalo turquoise to the Navajos in Arizona and New Mexico, who then work it into beautiful jewelry. Authentic Dry Creek or Sacred Buffalo Turquoise is also called **white buffalo turquoise**. It should never be confused with other stones that are called “white buffalo” which are actually howlite, magnesite, and other white stones that usually have gray and

black matrices in them (**matrix** is the dark minerals that show up within the stone). While howlite, native to California, and other white stones are very beautiful and are used often in Native American made



jewelry, they are definitely not turquoise. We call them the “white buffalo stone”, but never call them “turquoise”. Another name for these white stones is “appaloosa” for the black spots that sometimes appear in the stone. Howlite can also trick you when it is dyed a turquoise color (a.k.a. Tidy Bowl Turquoise). In honest circumstances, this dyed stone can be an inexpensive substitute for turquoise carvings, beads, and stones set in jewelry. The Dry Creek mine has been closed, so there are few stones to work into jewelry. Native American jewelry designers say that **Dry Creek Turquoise is "beyond rare"**.
